Her story...

Melanie Carina Schmoll has always been curious. Especially about the past. At the age of 9, she was able to memorize the order of the Roman columns and the names of the capitals. At the age of 10, she visited the ancient sites of Hippocrates on Kos. At 14, she read Gandhi.

After graduating from high school, she studied history, political science, modern German literature, European and international law, Spanish and philosophy at the Christian-Albrechts-Universität Kiel and the Freie Universität Hamburg. She completed her BA and MA in History, Political Science and Philosophy. She received her doctorate from the Faculty of Philosophy at the University of Hamburg with a thesis on the security regime between Israel and Jordan.

Her interest in the eastern Mediterranean region grew and with it her interest in the people, culture, and religion. As a German in Israel, she was repeatedly confronted with the darkest chapter of history. Although Melanie did not actually want to work in this field, but was always much more interested in security issues and peace research, her professional career was increasingly heading towards the seemingly inevitable. After studying educational science at the University of Hagen, being recognized as a secondary school teacher by the City of Hamburg's Department of Schools and Education and teaching at schools in the Hanseatic city for four years alongside her academic work, it was clear: German history, National Socialism, the Holocaust, and hatred of Jews - these are her topics. And that is still the case today.

That is what her speeches are about:

How to deal with Jew hatred and Israel-hatred? How to teach History and especially the Holocaust? How can teaching materials be designed so that they are unbiased and balanced? And most importantly:

What can we do to change minds for making the world a better place?
